Much of the stock is only available in small numbers and is supplied on a first come, first served, basis.

Please note that I can only accept orders placed before the end of August. Parcels will be dispatched in the last week in August or beginning of September. If you are going to be away please let me know so that I can coordinate dispatch. I will not cash your cheque until your order is dispatched.

Acis autumnale var pulchellus A Moroccan version of this excellent early autumn flowerer. It is quite distinct in the fact that the pedicels and bracts are green rather than maroon as in the type variety. Good in a raised bed in full sun. 3 for £2.50

Acis niceaense From the Alpes Maritime. White bells on 10cm stems are produced in May. £2.50

Acis trichophyllum This lovely form with a slight pink shaded white flower won the Farrer Medal in London in 2014. It is easy to grow and if kept warm and undisturbed, it will flower nicely. 5 assorted sized bulbs: £3.50

Albuca humilis 15cm spikes of marzipanscented white flowers with a central green stripe in summer. £2.00

Albuca sp yellow This "appeared" in our collection – a nice surprise. Yellow & duskygreen flowers on 40cm stems £2.00

Allium acuminatum ex NNS0012. Dog Mtn, Columbia Gorge. Umbels of 10–40 brilliant roseviolet flowers on 10 cm stems on this tiny west coast onion from a moist maritime climate. The tepals are distinctively sharply pointed and outcurved. 3 for £4.00

Allium bollandieri From the Siskiyou mountains. Striking heads of violet purple stars on 15 cm stems. £2.50

Allium karataviense Seed raised stock of a form with white flowers and lime green ovaries. Easy in the garden: £2.50

Arisarum vulgare Green striped spathes produced in autumn. 3 for £3.50

Bellavalia forniculata An amazing turquoise blue which colours the meadows at snowmelt time in NE Anatolia. £3.50

Biarum tenuifolium Brown spathes and spadix in June after the leaves are dormant. £2.00

Brimeura amethystina var alba Easy and very beautiful in the garden and flowers in late May – June. 3 for £2.00

Brimeura fastigiata "white flowered form" A sweet little Corsican bulb for a pot and the late shows. Wide open flowers on short stems in June. £2.00

Brodiaea elegans Umbels of large pale violet, funnelshaped flowers on short stems. £2.00

Caloscordum nerineifolium A useful summer flowering bulb which looks just like a small Nerine. Easy to grow. £3.00

Chionodoxa cretica Rarely offered snow melt plant with racemes of pale blue flowers which open flat in mid March. £2.50

Chionodoxa forbesii The true plant which grows near Fethiye in SW Turkey. White centred dark blue flowers. £2.00

Chionodoxa luciliae The nomenclature of the Turkish species is a bit of a minefield but this is the one with huge deep blue, white throated flowers. We believe this to be the true plant which came from Liz Strangman and it agrees with what we found on Boz Dag, the type locality, in 2014. £2.00

Chionodoxa luciliae var alba The wonderful white form of the above which grows so well in Jenny Archibald's garden. £2.00

Chionodoxa nana A small Cretan species believed to be a high altitude form of *C cretica* with lots of pale blue flowers. £2.50

Colchicum baytopiorum from S Turkey. A neat dwarf Colchicum, large, open pink nontesselated, flowers appear with the neat brightgreen leaves in the autumn. A great one for the autumn shows. This had done very well this year so... Special offer 3 for £7.00

Colchicum cupanii subsp cupanii ex Cretan stock of this white to pale pink species which flowers with the leaves in autumn. £3.50

Corydalis section Corydalis

This section includes all the *Corydalis solida* types with small tubers which multiply vegetatively. Most grow best in cool woodland conditions with a cool, nottoodry, summer.

Corydalis angustifolia 'Gemini' We collect some seed from a twinspurred form of this and it breeds true with little *Dicentra* shaped flowers in a sort of offwhite. Unique! £5.00

Corydalis caucasica subsp caucasica The joy of the Caucasus with its rose purple flowers. It grows in shade, flowering as the snow melts. £3.00

Corydalis glaucescens Seedlings of plants we obtained many years ago as *C kashgarica*. Soft pink flowers. £3.00

Corydalis malkensis One of the best outdoor species which seeds around freely yet it is only above the ground briefly, showing off its largelipped creamy white flowers, so it is never a nuisance. £2.50

Corydalis tauricola Elegant sprays of long pink flowers on 15 cm stems. £3.00

Corydalis section Leontocoides

The glory of the snow melt and excellent plants for a pot in the alpine house. It is not easy to obtain stock of this group since the tubers rarely divide and are self sterile so you need at least two clones to get seed. I offer 3 4 year old seedlings which are not huge but neither is the price.

Corydalis seisumsiana Beautiful white, pinklipped, flowers on a delightful dwarf plant from the snow melts of the Elburz. £8.00

Corydalis aff seisumsiana Iran, Mazandaran, S of Kalardasht. Keys out to this but looks rather different from the above in its more finely divided leaves and more airy habit. £8.00

Corydalis verticillaris One of the gems of a very beautiful section with spikes of anything from creamy white to pale pink, long spurred flowers which in some can reflex in a loop right over the back of the flower like a posing ballerina. £8.00

Crocus cancellatus subsp mazziaricus The western form of this white or pale mauve species. £2.50

Crocus fleischeri Although not the largest species, the narrow white tepals show off a greatly branched bright red stigma. £2.00

Crocus kotschyanus An easy and lovely species for the autumn. 5 of varying sizes to start you with a reasonable potful. £2.00

Crocus niveus Large pure white or pale lilac flowers with a long tube and a yellow throat are produced in late autumn. £2.50

Crocus nudiflorus This has established well on our rock garden and produces its deep mauve flowers from the rhizomatous corms in new places every early autumn. It is stunning in the Wisley alpine meadow. £2.00

Dicentra cucullaria A stunning 15cm tall north American woodlander with deeply cut grey foliage and spikes of creamcoloured Dutchman's breechesshaped flowers in April. £2.50

Erythronium 'Pagoda'	Pale lemon flowers held above the foliage. Another good one for the garden.	£3.00
Eucomis amaryllidifolia	In our opinion, one of Jim Archibald's best introductions from S Africa. Dwarf "pineapple top" over neat broad prostrate foliage. Green flowers on a short stem in midsummer. Dry in winter, water in summer.	£3.00
Freesia occidentalis	White flowers in early spring. Cold greenhouse hardy!	3 for £2.50
Fritillaria crassifolia ssp crassifolia	In the wild, a committed scree dweller but easy in cultivation. In the wild these plants are only 6 cm tall with flowers which sit on the stones.	£4.00
Fritillaria crassifolia ssp kurdica	Flowers may be purple, green, yellow or more commonly some combination of these.	£4.00
Fritillaria minuta	Orangy flowers and bright green leaves from this snow melt bulb of SE Turkey. A mixture of bulb sizes to the value of:	£3.00
Fritillaria olivieri	A robust species in the <i>crassifolia</i> group from moist fields in the Zagros mountains of Iran. A packet of assorted sizes to the value of:	£3.00
Fritillaria reuteri	A rarely offered plant of the Baktiari country in the Zagros where huge colonies of it can be found in running snow melt water. Superb mahogany bells with yellow tips.	£5.00
Gagea mauritanica	An underrated genus and this little gem produces clouds of little pale yellow flowers on 5cm stems. The tangle of roots you will receive look dead on arrival but panic not. They should come up in the spring. Morocco.	£2.00
Galanthus species ex Georgia.	We grew all these originally from wild seed which originated in Georgia and have used the names that the Georgians, who fall into the "splitters" camp, use:	
G alpinus	large flowers on short stems and neat grey convoluted foliage. Second generation seedlings	£5.00
G caucasicus	Borjomi Bakuriani, Georgia, 900 m. One could be persuaded that this has slightly broader foliage than <i>G alpinus</i> .	£5.00
G kemulariae	From beech woods near the famous Saguramo Monastery. The bright green leaves are characteristic.	£5.00
G lagodechianus	Another bright green leaved one from mixed woodland near the Gremi monastery, 450 500 m	£5.00
Galanthus elwesii	Martyn Rix very kindly gave us stock of this fabulous <u>autumnflowering</u> one from south of Gulnar.	£10.00
Galanthus gracilis	Distinctive narrow twisted grey green leaves characterise this Snowdrop. The inner tepals have a green mark on both the base and the tip.	3 for £6.50
Galanthus ikariae	From the broad green convolute leaves arise the flowers with the distinctively broad green inner apical mark.	£10.00
Galanthus peshmenii	The Turkish autumn flowering snowdrop. Easy in a pot or planted in a sunny spot in the garden.	£6.00
Galanthus peshmenii "Kastellorizo Form"	Rix4010 Vegetatively propagated bulbs of the original introduction of the form from the island of the same name by Martyn Rix. In this, the AM clone, the leaves appear with the flowers.	£10.00

'Diggory'	a <i>G plicatus</i> type with flowers the texture of seersucker. The outer segments incurve at the apex to resemble a whisky still.	£20.00
'Edinburgh Ketton'	A fine plicate with large shapely flowers and a characteristic Hshaped inner mark.	£8.00
'Little Ben'	"Little" is a complete misnomer. It has huge flowers which hang near the ground on their arching pedicels. Considered to be the finest member of the 'Mighty Atom' complex.	£15.00
'Lady Elphinstone'	The wellknown yellowtipped double.	3 for £8.00
'Peter Gatehouse'	A late autumnflowering <i>G elwesii</i> . Short and perky with a pale, olive green inner mark.	£15.00
'Primrose Warburg'	The great yellow marked, and ovaried, plicate.	£20.00
'Rosemary Burnham'	You can't beat this <i>G elwesii</i> with almost completely green outers.	£30.00
'Sutton Courtney'	A robust <i>G gracilis</i> hybrid. Early flowering with a distinctive bright olivegreen ovary.	£10.00
'Wasp'	A <i>G nivalis</i> with unusually long tepals.	£10.00
Habranthus gracilifolius	Summer flowering with the onset of watering. The flowers change colour between pink and peach.	£2.00
Habranthus martinezii	A most attractive summer flowering bulb producing a succession of pale pink funnels on 20cm stems.	3 for £3.50
Habranthus texensis	An easy late summer bulb with golden yellow flowers.	£2.00
HYACINTHELLA	is a delightful, underrated, genus which contains some real gems for the early shows where they are becoming increasingly popular (and winning!) exhibits.	
Hyacinthella acutiloba	Broad convolute leaves nestle the pale blue flowers as they emerge in spring.	£2.50
Hyacinthella glabrescens	This one is named after its greygreen leaves but the striking racemes of lovely blue bells are why we grow and show it.	£2.50
Hyacinthella heldreichii	ex RRW92103 from the central Cilician Taurus. A beautiful dark blueflowered form.	£2.00
Hyacinthella lineata	The glaucous leaves really set off the bright blue flowers of this member of the genus.	£2.00
Hyacinthella millengrenii	A low altitude species endemic to the limestones of Cyprus. Spikelike racemes of about 10, sessile, paleblue bells above 2 glaucous leaves. It increases rapidly.	3 for £2.50
Hyacinthella siirtensis	Turkey, Hop Pass. Ex JJA571500. Spikes of little pale blue stemless flowers with dark blue anthers from this tight endemic from the edge of the Syrian desert.	£2.50
Hyacinthoides lingulata (formerly Scilla)	An easygoing reliable little bluebell which is excellent for the autumn shows. Sweetly scented, upwardfacing, blue flowers on 10cm stems. I can offer three different forms which vary in both flowering time and shade of the blue. To ensure that one at least is in flower for the show:	3 of each form for £10.00
Ipheion dialystemon	Bright yellow flowers with brown stripes on the outside. Flowers over a long period in early spring. Dried bulbs may remain dormant for the first season. I will supply bulbs which have been kept slightly moist so hopefully these will not.	3 for £3.50
Ipheion 'Jessie'	A beautiful seedling of 'Rolf Fiedler' with even darker flowers.	£2.00
Iris histrioides 'Major'	A super dwarf bulb which is now difficult to obtain but it has kept going in our gardens for more than 30 years. Dark blue.	£3.00
Iris reichenbachii	mixed colours. Seed raised from our show plants. Large bearded Irises on 15 cm stems. The colours can vary from yellow to deep mauve and since they have flowered, we can provide either yellow or mauve if you prefer. All are beautiful.	£3.00
Ixia paniculata	Branched racemes of stunning peachy blooms with a long tube in early summer. Easy and hardy under unheated glass. A most spectacular plant in our bulb house in early summer which has escaped and flowers well in the garden. Special Offer: 3 for £4.00	
Ixiolirion tataricum	A rarely offered bulb from right the way through Asia with a few deep blue trumpets on a 20cm stem.	£2.00
Muscari adillii	LST097a. Described in 1999 from a very narrow niche habitat in Ankara province on marly white limestone. Few.	£3.00
Muscari anatolicum	Turkey, Sivas, Ziyaret Pass. Deep blue flowers with a marked white rim on tiny stems from rock crevices. This was our opinion of what we had found and it may be the same as <i>M aff discolor</i> JJA689.300 below. A super little plant.	£2.50
Muscari armeniacum 'Gül'	So much admired when I put it on my stall in Kent Show 2004, that it got taken to Joint Rock and awarded a PC as long as we named it! 'Gül' is Turkish for 'rose' which describes the flush on the otherwise white flowers. We have selected seedlings over several generations from our original introduction from the Taurus mountains and they now come consistently true.	£3.00
Muscari aucheri	Bright sky blue with paler lobes from a moister part of northern Turkey.	£2.00
Muscari azureum	Beautiful and choice. Pale blue flowers on this snow melt bulb from Ala Dag, S Turkey.	£2.00
Muscari coeleste	Bolkar Dag ex JCA17965. Pale blue flared flowers in typical <i>Muscarilike</i> spikes with neat glaucous foliage.	£2.00
Muscari commutatum	Distinctive blackish violet flowers in a dense raceme on 15 cm stems.	£2.50

- Muscari discolor** ex JCA17760 W of Urfa. Blackish purple open bells with a superb white mouth. Probably needs a cold winter to flower well. £2.50
- Muscari aff discolor** ex JJA 689.300 Turkey, Sivas, Ziyaret. 2100m. Exposed, limestone gravel ridges. Similar to, but not the same as, typical *M. discolor* from the N edge of the Syrian Desert. Tiny with whitemouthed, dark blue bells. Jim's view was that this is closer to *M. anatolicum* and I have to say that I agree but either way it is a smashing little plant but none too easy. £2.50
- Muscari inconstictum** Eye catching electric blue and black flowers. A choice and striking plant from the Levant. £2.50
- Muscari kerkis** seed raised from Gothenburg AS54744. Small dark, white rimmed, fertile flowers overtopped with blue sterile ones. £2.50
- Muscari leucostomum** Ex a J. Ruksans collection from Turkmenistan Kopet Dag. An eastern species, allied to *M. neglectum*, barely known in cultivation. Distinct blue black flowers with distinct white lobes. £2.50
- Muscari muscarimi** Fabulously pineapple scented flowers which can vary from yellow to bluish cream from the high screes of western Turkey. Few. £3.50
- Muscari parviflorum** It is not easy to persuade this autumn flowering species to bloom freely but we managed it for Horsham Show in 2006 and got a Certificate of Merit. The "hot, no repot" regime seems to work. For 5 bulbs £2.00
- Muscari sp nova** This little chap came to us from seed collected on the south side of Lake Van in Eastern Anatolia. It can have either pale blue or white flowers and is easy to grow. If it is not new then we cannot identify it in the up to date Flora of Turkey. £2.00
- Muscari verticillaris** Iran, 1km. S of Amam Zada Hashim. 2500m. Ex SLIZE 031. A nice blue armeniacum type with a rosette of leaves but we cannot find any more information on the name. £3.00
- Narcissus albidus** A fourer, Morocco. I just cannot accept that this is a form of *N. romieuxii*. It is nothing like it. Robust large flowered hoop petticoat with huge white trumpets. Very similar to the prize winning SF 110. £2.00
- Narcissus bulbocodium var filifolius** Ann Borrill kindly gave us some bulbs with this name. As the name suggests, it has very fine foliage for the large butter yellow flowers. £2.00
- Narcissus bulbocodium var pallidus** A nice pale coloured form. £2.00
- Narcissus bulbocodium ssp praecox var paucinervis RRW84.18** This is what the plant keys to according to Maire who made extensive studies of Moroccan Narcissi. Although only a form of *N. bulbocodium*, it is quite distinct. One of the earliest bulbocodiums to flower, often in January. The flowers open just above ground level and the stems gradually increase to 1015cm. From near Ifrane growing at 1500m. £2.00
- Narcissus cantabricus** Sparkling white Spanish hoop petticoat. £3.00
- Narcissus confusus** Dwarf deep yellow trumpet section species from the Salamancas area. 3 for £4.00
- Narcissus cordubensis** A jonquil type from the area around Grazelema in S. Spain. Easily recognised by its frilly 6lobed bright yellow corona. Wonderfully scented. A good garden plant. £2.00
- Narcissus cuatrecasasii** (few). A committed cliff dweller from Serrania de Ronda which is like a large flowered *N. rupicola*. £3.50
- Narcissus fernandesii** Seed raised from correctly identified wild stock. Lots of sweetly scented flowers with an undivided cup. £2.50
- Narcissus 'Gypsy Queen'** A nice pale flowered dwarf trumpet hybrid with twisted foliage. £2.00
- Narcissus jonquilla** The sweetly scented jonquil which is rarely offered as the straight species. £2.00
- Narcissus jonquilla var henriquesii** A sub species with a longer straighter corona. 23 flowers on each 25cm tall stem. 3 for £3.50
- Narcissus jonquilla var minor** Amazingly floriferous sweetly scented jonquil with short stems. A must for every collection. £3.00
- Narcissus minor 'Douglas Bank'** One of the best dwarf trumpets for the rock garden. Vigorous and easy. £2.50
- Narcissus romieuxii** We keep quite a number of forms of this lovely easy early spring flowerer. I offer the following:
- '**flat corona**' A good very open flowered form selected from amongst our seedlings. £3.00
- JCA805.** Vegetative propagations from Jim's original introduction with a very frilly corolla. £2.00
- '**oddy**' An odd one with a longer trumpet than most so it has lost the character which distinguishes from *N. bulbocodium* even though it came from the same rocks on which *N. romieuxii* grew. A good increaser. £1.50
- Narcissus romieuxii var zaianicus** We feel that these sit rather better under *N. romieuxii* than *N. albidus* (where they were listed previously). A very variable taxon but this year's stock from Aguelmous are white flowered. £2.00
- Narcissus rupicola** ex Segovia, Spain. A nice dwarf little plant with glaucous leaves. £3.00
- Narcissus 'Solveig's Song'** A hybrid of my making between *N. bulbocodium tenuifolius* and *N. triandrus albus*. 12 flowers on a 12 cm stem. A 4cm long by 2cm wide corona is surrounded by twisted spreading tepals. Named (on Kath Dryden's insistence) after my sister. Admired wherever she goes the Narcissus that is. Special offer 3 for £2.50
- Narcissus 'Tenuior'** An old hybrid of *N. jonquilla* x *poeticus* described by Curtis in 1797. 20cm stems carry 4 cm pale yellow scented flowers. It is late flowering and so extends the daffodil season. Rarely offered. Special Offer 3 for: £4.00
- Narcissus triandrus var cernuus** Avila, Spain. Little pale flowers on 15cm stems. This seems to be easier to grow than many of the angel's tears as long as it is kept cool in summer. £4.00
- Narcissus x ubriquense** MS434/1 A stunningly beautiful vigorous natural hybrid which looks like a bright yellow *N. triandrus*. £5.00
- Narcissus romieuxii subsp zaianicus var lutescens x cantabricus SF161.** A bit of a mouthful in a taxonomic mixing bowl for something which is like a white *N. bulbocodium* with the *N. romieuxii* like frilly edge to the tepals. £2.00
- Nerine hirsuta** This seems to be a form of *N. filifolia* with hairy pedicels, the seed of which came from the well known plantsman, Harry Hay. Whatever it is, it is an easy going hardy bulb for a pot in a cold greenhouse with pink wavy edged flowers on 15cm stems. 3 for £2.50
- Nerine gaberonensis** One of the most attractive of the pink flowered species with threadlike leaves. 515 irregular flowers on 25cm stems. Beautifully illustrated on the AGS website. £3.00
- Nerine humilis var alba** The fabulous white form of a dwarf frilly tepalled Nerine, which does well in a pot and may grow outside in favoured areas. £5.00
- Nerine masoniorum** Rather open flowers with pink wavy petals on 6" stems over threadlike leaves in autumn. £2.00
- Nothoscordum sp P&W7455** White flowered and sweetly scented in the summer on 30cm stems. £2.00
- Odontostomium hartwegii.** An interesting bulb in the Tecophilaceae from meadows in northern California. Racemes of creamy white flowers with reflexed tepals in late spring. £3.00
- Ornithogalum cydni** Turkey, nr Arslanköy. What a great name for this nice little species. It's a pity that it is now *O. wiedemanii* var *relexum!* £2.00
- Ornithogalum narbonense** Seed collected in 2004 near Mugla, S Turkey. 25cm spikes of white flowers and a good garden plant. 3 for £2.50
- Ornithogalum oligophyllum** Short spikes of green and white flowers. Widespread and easy. £1.50
- Ornithogalum pyrenaica var flavescens** This grows well with us in our herbaceous borders. Spikes of pale yellow on 1m stems. £2.00
- Ornithogalum sibthorpiana** Very similar to *O. nanum* but has grooved flower stalks. A flat topped umbel of white flowers. £2.00
- Oxalis speciosa** We are often asked how we flower this plant. We just treat it like most of our bulbs. It is re-potted each August and only a small number of the largest bulbs are grown on. In our experience it definitely does not need to be pot bound. 3 for £3.50
- Polyxenia longituba** Pale lilac flowers in autumn. 3 for £3.50
- Rhodophiala aff bifida** Harry gave us these bulbs many years ago in order to get them into cultivation. His group showed quite a variation from pale pink to deep red but those that we had are all red. It may well be a hybrid because it is vigorous and flowers with its amaryllis like trumpets in early September. Treat as any other Mediterranean type bulb with a dryish summer and water in early September. It needs a deep pot or could probably be tried outside. £4.00
- Romulea bifida var granitiflora** Like a small version of the above and equally beautiful. £4.00

Romulea bifida	I can't really see much difference from that above.	£3.00
Romulea clusiana	Traceable back to a Joy Hulme introduction from Gibraltar. Large deep violet flowers with a yellow centre.	£2.50
Romulea leichtliniana	A whiteflowered species otherwise rather like the above and with darker backs to the tepals.	£2.50
Romulea namaquense	S Africa. Starry white flowers.	£3.00
Scilla caucasica	The seed came from near the Gremi monastery in Georgia where the pod remnants were quite difficult to distinguish from <i>Galanthus lagodechianus</i> , so these were a nice surprise. Eyehurting blue flowers.	£2.50
Scilla cilicica	RRW96.28. Shaded cliff base on Jebel Nusairia, Syria. We have now been persuaded that this is the correct name for this beauty since it fits with plants of that name in Israel. Racemes of pretty, reflexed flowers like small blue shooting stars.	£2.50
Scilla ingridae var taurica	The snowmelt moistened meadows of central Turkey are carpeted with this blue beauty.	£2.00
Scilla libanotica	Seedlings from Lebanese stock. Large pale blue outwardfacing flowers with conspicuous dark blue anthers.	£2.50
Scilla morrissii	Endemic to Cyprus with pale pinky mauve flowers. Easy in a pot.	£2.00
Scilla persica	An inhabitant of seasonally, really wet soils and ditches in Iran and E Turkey so will probably grow outside. Airy spikes of starry blue flowers. Small bulbs.	£2.00
Scilla puschkinioides	Another snowmelt species but from Central Asia. White flowers with a greenish tinge.	£2.00
Sternbergia greuteriana	To me, many of the plants available with this name look like <i>S. sicula</i> . This is the true almost sessile plant from Karpathos. Small obtusetipped bright yellow tepals on a carpet of tiny green leaves. Can make a stunning potful.	£5.00
